Our high school graduates will be honored during the service on Sunday, May 19th, with a reception in their honor in Fellowship Hall following the service.



From Reverend Mike's Desk

Labyrinth at First Presbyterian to be Dedicated on Sunday, May 5th

Have you noticed the black and grey bricks neatly arranged in a circular pattern where the playground used to be? That is a prayer labyrinth. First Presbyterian Church of Marietta is one of the few churches that have such a resource. We will dedicate the labyrinth on Sunday, May 5th as a part of the "Sip 'n Chat" after the Service for the Lord's Day.

You may wonder: what is a labyrinth? A labyrinth has meandering paths, with a singular path leading to the center. Labyrinths are an ancient archetype dating back some 4,000 years, used symbolically, as a walking meditation, choreographed dance, or site of rituals and ceremony, among other things. Labyrinths are tools for personal, psychological, and spiritual transformation, also thought to enhance right-brain activity. Labyrinths evoke metaphor, sacred geometry, spiritual pilgrimage, religious practice, mindfulness, environmental art, and community building.

People walk a labyrinth for many reasons. Some do it to relax, some as a walking meditation, some just for fun. Research is ongoing to understand all the benefits of walking a labyrinth. Labyrinths are not a "new age" fad. They have been found all over the world dating from the earliest antiquity. Labyrinths were often a part of medieval cathedrals. It was believed that a Christian should at least once in their life make pilgrimage to the Holy Land. However, that is a very expensive and time-consuming project. So, labyrinths were built to simulate that pilgrimage so that more Christians could have the "spiritual" benefits of a pilgrimage.

As First Presbyterian Church grows into this wonderful Resource, more information about its history and how to use it will become available. Please join us on Sunday, May 5th after worship to dedicate the First Presbyterian Church Prayer Labyrinth to the glory of God and for the use of the congregation and community of Marietta.

The Alun O. Jones Memorial Youth Activities Fund

A good example of how an established endowment fund can grow over the years and continue to keep on giving is The Alun O. Jones Memorial Youth Activities Fund. It was established in memory of the Reverend Alun O. Jones, minister of First Presbyterian Church from 1961 to 1969 (died September 21, 1969) with a gift of \$5,000. Upon her death Virginia Noe contributed \$10,000 to it. Today that \$15,000 has grown to \$85,000 in principal plus has income available for use of \$31,000. The income is available for special projects involving our youth in service to others where they have raised, by their own efforts, a portion of the necessary funding.

Per capita is the primary source of funding for the Office of the General Assembly, and is how Presbyterians mutually and equitably share the costs of coming together to discern the Spirit's leading for the future.

- It is how Presbyterians are trained to become better ruling elders, deacons, and ministers of word and sacrament/teaching elders.
- It is how Presbyterians come together to discern God's call in their lives.
- It is how Presbyterians participate in the life of the wider church by serving on General Assembly committees and commissions, regardless of distance or financial resources.
- It is how Presbyterians participate in the life of the Church universal as we commit ourselves to work and live in fellowship with "all persons in every nation" (BOOK OF ORDER, G-4.0101)
