#### David Nuss, A First Presbyterian Church Treasure by Cathy Piekarski

Organists never have grown on trees, especially gifted ones; and projections are that such musicians are near extinction, only one of many reasons that Marietta First Presbyterians appreciate the exceptional organ music their organist of many years, David Nuss, creates on the pipe organ. Members dread the day David retires.



On December 11, 1945, Clifford and Lavonne Nuss crossed the Kansas-Missouri state line into Kansas City, Missouri, and headed for Research Hospital for the birth of their son, David. The Nuss family then returned to Kansas for the next 3 years so that David's father could finish seminary. After finishing, the newly ordained American Baptist clergyman moved his family to a small church in Ipswich, South Dakota. It was at this church that David began noticing the organ due to the hat "doodad" that wig-

gled to and fro as the lady organist played the hymns. Soon David's fascination shifted from the hat to the organ, and he began banging first on a toy piano "like Schroeder" and then on the Ipswich church piano. To preserve their sanity, David's parents sent David for piano lessons at the age of 5; the piano lessons continued until the Nusses moved north to a church in Powers Lake, North Dakota. David blames the mostly Norwegian ladies of this church for turning him into a butterball by stuffing him with their irresistible pastries.

The family later moved to Bismarck, North Dakota. David's professional organ playing began when he was chosen as the organist at the Bismarck Church by the church's music committee.. The Rev. Clifford Nuss recused himself from the hiring process.

In school, David played trumpet and then French horn, apparently very well; his orchestra director suggested he try out for the Sioux Falls Symphony. David decided to focus on the keyboard and majored in music education and choral music at Sioux Falls College. He then took post graduate composition classes at Indiana University.

Before moving to Marietta, David sang in college choirs; played keyboard in jazz bands, bar bands and rock bands; and worked occasionally as an organist. The Marietta move came when David's parents moved here in 1976. Since then, David has served as organist at Emmanuel Baptist Church, St. Luke's Lutheran in Marietta, St. Paul's United Methodist in Parkersburg, and Marietta First Presbyterian. For about five years, David worked as an adjunct in Marietta College's music department. David also presently serves as the accompanist to the Parkersburg Choral Society. Learning in retirement courses taught by David at the college include great piano works, music history, and jazz. (story continues on page 2)

These have been some of my Julys— what about yours?



Motions presented and approved by session:

- 1. To approve a request from W&M for \$464 for the annual renewal of our Christian Copyright Licensing International license. Funds to be drawn from the Noe Organ Endowment Fund.
- 2. To approve a request from the church softball team for \$275 to cover the registration fee for c church members playing in the league. Funds to be drawn from the Effie Dent Spiritual Growth Fund.
- 3. To approve a request from Bonnie Donnelly for up to \$1500 to hold weekly fellowship dinners at Glenwood on Wednesdays from June August for up to 4 guest per week to maintain the pat tern of dining and socializing our senior members who have enjoyed the Wednesday night pro grams during the past year. Funds to be drawn from the Unrestricted Fund.
- 4. To approve a request from CE for \$500 for food and activity costs for a 41 hour Youth Lock in with three other churches. Funds to be drawn from the Effie Dent Spiritual Growth Fund.
- 5. To approve a request from Outreach for \$1630 to charter a bus to take church members and possibly others to Cambridge to attend the outdoor Living Word Drama on Friday, July 21. Funds to be drawn from the Effie Dent Memorial Congregational Spiritual Growth Fund.

# Soor Stewards of the Straw Challenge

As part of our Good Stewards of the Earth campaign, we are challenging all members of the First Presbyterian Family to change the way you do straws!!!

Americans alone use half a billion drinking straws every day! Disposable plastic straws are not recyclable, as they are too light to make their way through the plastic sorting systems at recycling plants. So what happens to all of these straws? They end up as litter, in land fills and in our waterways, where they are mistaken as food by many animals. Since plastic doesn't biodegrade, overtime, straws break down into "microplastics" - super small pieces of plastics that end up in our water and foods!

So what can we do about this? Alot! Reconsider your use of straws. Do you really need that straw in your drink? If you are just sipping at a table, at home or at a restaurant, forsake the straw! If you are traveling, use a reusable bottle or cup, some even come with built-in/re-usuable straws. If you must use a straw, try paper ones, or even re-usuable silicone, metal or recycled plastic straws.



In the Midst - Honduras Project Up-Date

As part of First Presbyterian Church's mission work for 2023, we have committed to funding the construction of a home for a family in Honduras. Their information can be found on the bulletin board in the narthex. They are the Yensiel Daniela Aguilar Archega family. Yensiel is a single mom of three children, ages 12, 10, and 7 years old. She makes a living by making homemade tortillas and selling them. In the Midst Honduras is coordinating the construction of the house as well as leading the family on their Christian journey.

As funds come in, we at FPC have been "constructing" our own version of the mission house in the narthex of the church. Our hope was to have enough money sent by June 1st this year to begin their house but we have only sent about half. The cost to build the house there is \$2200.00. That's why we need your help with this project! Deacon's and Outreach are sending \$200.00 a month for the house. Once we've reached the \$2200.00 goal, we will have a work crew build their house. If we collect more than the \$2200.00 for the house, the rest of the monies will be sent to "In The Midst" for help with their feeding kitchen, school supplies or uniforms for the children in the community that they serve. If you would like more information about this project or the Talanga, Honduras community, please feel free to ask Judy Peoples.

May God continue to bless you as you help us with this project. We are over halfway there!!
